On the phone I ran quite a few by him and he told me they were correct or regionalisms or....but in the main the words here are correct and, depending where you are, accurate. The authors are careful to note on each word whether it's archaic or more likely to be found in English speaking prisons in other countries but they've done their research and if they say it's accurate, it's accurate.
