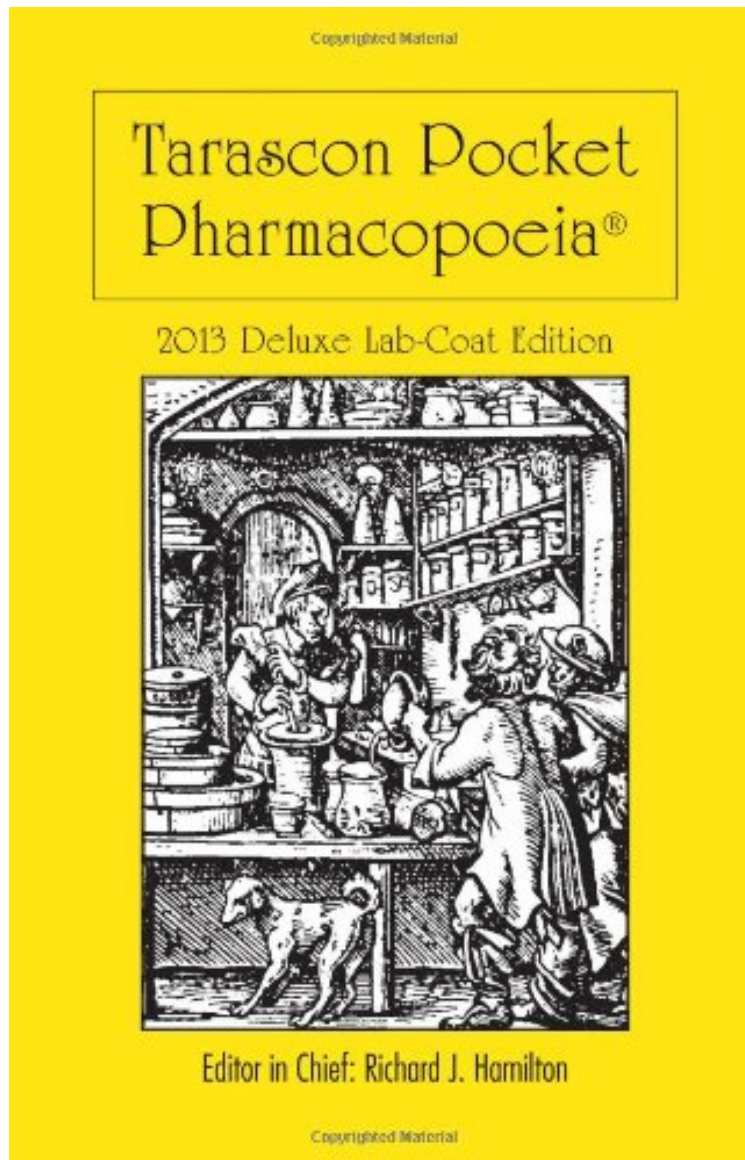

Pharmacopoeia is far and away the best and fastest medication reference I use (compared to Epocrates, PDR, all the other electronic stuff) for dosage, forms available, pricing data. The new issue has added, in red ink, the conditions for which each drug is most commonly used. This is an ENORMOUS help when I'm trying to sort out 15 medication bottles that the patient has brought in and has no idea what any of the meds were prescribed for. I still use the iPad Touch to look up the meds by picture or imprint, usually with Epocrates -- there is no way to include medication ID in the Tarascon pocket reference and keep it in a pocket. I am always astonished at how current the Tarascon references are! I get the new edition as soon as it is available every year. By John Pamperin Tarascon is my go to guide for drug information, and I purchase a new one every fall when the new edition comes out. The lab coat edition is a bit more expensive than the pocket version, but has so much more information. It includes recommended dosing, non-approved uses and doses, breast milk safety, cost, excretion routes. Drugs are organized by system and class, so if your patient can't get a class due to insurance, the alternatives in that class are right there! And the best part of all is that the print is so much BIGGER than the pocket version. Most of my colleagues use a smartphone drug guide, but my book is far simpler and so much faster to use than epocrates. My favorite drug reference, hands down By Aderyn I work for a medical transcription company, and the Tarascon Pocket Pharmacopoeia has been my favorite drug reference for years. Features I particularly like are its size, which makes it easy to have handy on your desktop without giving up much real estate; the index, which lists the drugs alphabetically with correct capitalization (if you work in transcription, you know this is often all you're checking on); and the organization of drugs by diagnosis, which saves many a blank in a report by helping narrow down the possible choices. For the money, the Pocket Pharmacopoeia really can't be beat. The lab-coat edition has more information than I need and is geared more toward the physician using it in the field, but I bought it this year in the hopes of its larger size allowing for larger print (all these years of staring at a computer screen have done my eyes no favor). Alas, that's not the case; it just allows it to include more information. I'll still need to keep the handy magnifier I got once with the pocket edition, and I'll still be back next year to get my updated copy!
